And Another Season Begins!

You knew that the Fall was nearly upon us when a mere two days after the Red Jacket Regatta the nighttime temperatures fell to the 40s. There were more signs of the impending arrival when you looked around... There was the Yacht Club Labor Day picnic with a good enough turnout and yet most seeking refuge from the elements inside the club as far as you could tell, for example.

So, yes, we had some weather for the first races in the Fall Series. Fall weather. I'm fairly sure that it didn't rain but it was still largely overcast and not one of those warm and quiet Summer days that draw so many families to the water's edge.

Ah! But we, with or without our families, are sailors! We seek not the quiet and calm of the Summer but rather the feistiness and (perhaps) intemperate nature of the Spring and Fall!

We were largely rewarded with said weather this past Sunday. The forecasts (from "those darned weather liars") called for 9ish from the South with the gusts building to perhaps 15 or so and tapering off before the end of our races. The temperatures predictions, in contrast, were actually pretty spot on – as they hovered in the low 70s for most of the day.

But, of course, and as you've already divined (and experienced) the winds were perhaps a bit stronger and a bit punchier than predicted. It's difficult, often, to judge the proper sail to fly from the relative quiet that the harbor of the Yacht Club affords, and this day was typical of that scenario. We couldn't see white caps in the middle – things had to be under control out there.

Ricky gave us a shorter first course of WNWN (**W**est Shore, **N**ear Maplewood twice around) for the first race. The winds for this one were 12ish gusting maybe 18 – pretty much from the South. The last boat to cross (*Shawondasee* in this case) had an average VMG (Velocity Made Good) of about 5 kts despite a few tactical and strategic errors (things like, oh, ahem, sorry John! Yes! I know! It was downwind so we're not doing as much but we should still be looking for the next mark!) leading to, among other things, broaching and rounding up directly into the line of *Little Wing*. Still, hey, it couldn't have been that bad, right? I mean, they didn't protest!

We had a second course of SFS (**S**ycamore, **F**ar Maplewood, **S**ycamore). We still had South winds but they'd built to closer to 15 on average with gusting in the mid 20s. Here's where the sail choices made in the lee of the harbor came a bit more in play!

Fantasy played all of it conservatively, with a crew of only two. Things looked pretty calm and cool on Little Wing (our crew said they looked like they were lounging about!) and we

don't recall seeing their spinnaker out. *Trevelyan* looked like she always does – either a spec on the horizon or a specter silently blowing past at speeds unattainable by your own vessel except in free fall. *Snitch* and *Mehitabel*? Oh, they were racing, too. Somewhere in that mix! It felt, from the position of *Shawondasee*, that *Snitch* played it a bit riskier with the chute up much closer to the windward mark and yet my memory seems to say that *Mehitabel* must have flown hers as well.
