Saturday June 20 2PM meet up to celebrate Sailstice

This Saturday we'll meet on the water off of the Point at 2PM to celebrate the passage into summer – and sailing! The tentative plan is to pick a latitude based on the weather and all sail up to it. We'll probably raft up for a bit and then sail back! Bring a VHF tuned to 80A if you want to know where we're headed but realistically you can probably just follow the other boats up (or down!) the lake!

What are we going to do the rest of the year???

Ten of us met online Wednesday evening to discuss what the rest of the year will look like. A few of the things thrown out include:

- In the Fall we may have 2 starts for races with PHRF high boats in the first start and PHRF low boats in the second. We'll wait to see what the enthusiasm level for racing is and how many boats we have out. Having 2 starts would reduce the time that the fast boats wait between races and it would make starts simpler with fewer boats on the line at a time.
- We're still going to hold a Sheldrake Cup it will just be at a later date.
- We are not hold a white sail regatta on June 28.
- The fall series will stay the same for now and we will still attempt to hold most of the schedule as is.
- You will help decide what the summer racing series looks like.

On the calendar as it exists right this second (all can change at any time with Covid!) we have six weekends that are "open". The options you'll choose from include Latitude-style races, buoy races or a mixture of Latitude and buoy. The full draft calendar is, of course, attached.

Latitude races have each boat sailing a measured distance based on handicap. Faster boats sail further. We all start at the same time and in theory all finish at the same time! However we do not actually all finish at the same time and thus the order crossing the finish line directly determines the finish place of the boat. These races are up and back (or perhaps twice around this year). You do not need to write down your finish times. These

races are easy to participate in when short on crew, in slower boats or when training crew. If it's blowing like crazy these races are generally easier to hold as there is only one rounding.

Buoy races have each boat sailing the same course around a fixed set of buoys. We all start at the same time (or perhaps have a staggered start as mentioned above) and all boats are expected to note their finish times. Results are determined after the fact through the magic of math and computers. These races are closer to traditional dinghy racing in which it is generally better to have a full and experienced crew. On very windy days these races are very difficult in that they require more boat handling.

Traditionally we have held Latitude races in the summer to encourage more boats to come out. This summer we would have a few more boats out if we held Latitudes (Qiii, TJ and Bill are three who will/might come out).

Racers with full and experienced crew find that buoy racing is more interesting and appropriate. Those interested only in real racing might not come out if races are not in this format.

The 50/50 case would allow for a mixture of those kinds of racing. Since the weekends are in groups of 2 perhaps each group would have 1 race of each kind.
