Tales From The Frostbite Regatta

We happened to have a rather windy day for our last sailing day, this past Sunday. It was a tad nippy but not so much so that you'd need a drysuit or even, generally, foul weather gear. And it was a tad breezy – generally building to the point where foul weather sails would have been quite appropriate.

Sweat Pants bowed out of racing when the gusting hit 25 and Trevelyan (and the rest of the fleet) did likewise when the gusts got closer to 40. Perhaps with backstays and a second reef in the main the former, the Witherup's newly acquired Columbia 30 Sport Sailor, would have stayed out a bit longer. As for the latter – the Stephens Corsair 28? We were a bit surprised to see her out in this much wind but we did note a few things... It was the first time in memory that we saw her fly her central hull and it was also the first time we recall seeing her fly a storm jib!
